

The Disaster Resilient Australia New Zealand School Education Network (DRANZSEN) consists of representatives from education and emergency services, NGOs, universities, local government and community groups. Participants at this event will explore effective models of disaster resilience education (DRE) to reduce risk and strengthen communities, through student participation and partnership for learning.

The Queensland DRANZSEN Forum will explore:

- climate change impacts on natural hazards in Queensland
- engaging with schools for effective learning partnerships
- local programs and resources for disaster resilience education
- experiences and perspectives of children in emergencies and disasters.

The Disaster Resilience Australia New Zealand Schools Education Network (DRANZSEN) seeks to:


- communicate a shared understanding of DRE connected to international frameworks and relevant to an Australian context
